#### TO PIC OR NOT TO PIC



Many of you are sprucing up the exterior of your homes. Do you need to fill out a Property Improvement Form before doing so? Maybe. Here are some common things that come up:

Replacing the front door with the same type NO

Replacing the front door with a different style YES

Adding a storm or screen door YES

Adding A/C units or heat pumps YES

Adding solar panels or anything else to the roof YES

Adding or removing trees YES

Adding plants or decorative elements that exceed 1' in height YES

#### PARKING



Street parking is at a premium on some streets in our community. If there is a concern with an abandoned or junk vehicle, or vehicle is blocking a driveway or is otherwise improperly parked and it is on a city street, that is an issue for the Mount Vernon Police Department to address. Section 10.20.150 does say parking on any public street is limited to 24 hours. If you are working from home and as such your vehicle stays put for days on end, consider leaving a note on the dashboard with your address or contact info. Neighbors may not know which vehicles belong to which households, and leaving a note can help distinguish resident vehicles from truly abandoned vehicles.

If the vehicle in question is parked in an alley, that is HOA jurisdiction, the police will not address it. To report a vehicle blocking in the alley, contact the community association manager at skagithighlands@trestlecm.com or call 425-214-9344.



#### GARBAGE CANS



### MAINTAINING LANDSCAPING

All the sunshine we've had certainly has caused the grass and weeds to grow! The community association management drives through the community once a month to evaluate not only landscaping and exterior tidiness but also to check for exterior alterations.

Remember – the first letter, the one titled Courtesy Notice is just that – a notice. A simple call or email to the CAM showing the correction is all it takes for the violation to be closed out. If you've made an alteration to the exterior of your home and it was not approved, you will be asked to fill out a PIC form and submit it. ### STREET TREE MAINTENANCE

Many of us remember the horrible tree trimming job the City did a few months ago. After repeated requests the City made to homeowners, the City took matters into their own hands and trimmed trees such that branches would no longer interfere with the mechanized arms of the trash/recycle/yard waste trucks. It's also helpful to not put the bins directly under a tree if that's an option.

The trees that are between the sidewalk and the street and adjacent to your property are your responsibility to maintain. Trimming branches that are hazardous to street vehicles as well as pedestrians on sidewalk is important. It also promotes healthy growth and gives the trees a better shape. Spring time is a good time to trim the street trees when they begin actively growing.

The Board is considering requesting a bid to professionally trim the trees next spring. If we all do our part, it will greatly reduce the cost of trimming over 1200 trees in our community, saving the HOA tens of thousands of dollars. And that means keeping assessments low.
